CVHS Introduces the Fabulous Five and Pet of the Month

CHVS has spotlighted a different adoptable pet on the shelter's website every week for many years, but this past December marked the first time the shelter has ever tried highlighting a Pet of the Month.

"This new program is something completely different," CVHS Promotions Coordinator Alaina Goodnough explains. "Because we have an entire month to spotlight one animal, we can really help the public get to know them through candid photos, videos, and even staff and volunteer testimonials." In addition to the heavy advertising throughout the month, each Pet of the Month will have a reduced adoption fee.

Created by CVHS Shelter Manager Kris Halsey, the Pet of the Month program was designed to draw attention to some of the shelter's longest residents. "Some of these animals have been with us for months," says Halsey, "and we're hoping this will really help us get the word out about them."

In creating the Pet of the Month program, Halsey was drawn to five dogs in particular that had each been at the shelter for 100 days or more. Realizing that these dogs had spent many hours of the past few months alone in their kennels, Halsey created the Fabulous Five program to help build time into each staff member's day to spend one-on-one with these long-term residents.

Each staff member was assigned one of the Fabulous Five dogs and was responsible for spending 10 minutes every hour with that dog. They could go for a walk, take a ride, play with toys, or even just sit and cuddle. To help with the project, the staff members transformed two areas of the shelter into "just like home" rooms where the dogs could get away from the noise and stress of the kennels and relax with the staff members.

"We understand a lot of our supporters aren't in a position to adopt," she continues, "but we hope they'll share our Facebook posts and tell their friends about these animals. That's how these long-term residents are going to find their forever homes."



The original Fabulous Five program started with all dogs (above) but, as they've gone home, the shelter has started spotlighting long-term feline residents, as well. All adoptable animals have been spayed/neutered, are up-to-date on their vaccines, and are microchipped.

The program has already had a tremendous response. The dogs have been greatly enjoying their special one-on-one time and adopters have been asking to meet the Fabulous Five. Since launching the program in January, three of the original Fabulous Five have been adopted, opening space in the program for more animals that would benefit from the extra attention, including long-term cats.

Pet First Aid Course Offered at Shelter

Mark your calendars! CVHS will be holding a Pet First Aid class with April Begosh of Healthy Pets NH on Saturday, April 12th from 10am to 3pm at the shelter. This class will cover restraining an animal, pet CPR, rescue breathing, choking management, poisoning, injury assessment, bleeding protocols, and bites and stings. Participants will be certified in pet first aid for two years upon completing the course. The cost for this class is \$65 (includes a workbook) with \$25 of the fee going to CVHS. Space is limited! CVHS Holds 20th Annual Dog Walk

Shelter Joins Pets for Patriots

Cocheco Valley Humane Society was recently accepted as a shelter partner with Pets for Patriots, an organization that works to help shelter animals find homes with members of the military. Shelter pets eligible for adoption through this program must be either a dog or cat two years or older, a dog over 40 pounds, or a special needs dog or cat. Eligible pets are available to Pets for Patriots participants for a reduced adoption fee and, after adoption, local veterinary partners agree to offer ongoing discounted care.

Presentations are tailored to meet the specific topic requests of each group and, when possible, involve an animal available for adoption from the shelter.


